1. How often do you travel through Windham?


Of the 635 responses, 88% traveled through Windham daily, 11% weekly and 2% less frequently.

99% of 632 respondents travel through Windham by car.


3. Where in Windham are visitors most likely to get lost?


- 20 participants identified areas people would get lost in areas that were broad and could not be identified to a specific area of town other than "back roads, outskirts, rural or residential areas".
- 6 participants commented that it was difficult to find parking areas of trail heads, trails, beaches and water access.

Participants that didn't provide a response to this question, indicated they didn't know, indicated private roads which we cannot place signs on, or provided an unrelated or comical response were grouped as "No Comment".

The results from the 601 responses was fairly close with only 57 votes between the most popular choice of the multi-colored signage and the least popular choice of the mono-colored signage.







Of 635 survey participants, 622 provided a vote on their favorite neighboring community signage. The clear winner was Falmouth's signage with 274 of 622 votes. Second place was Bridgton with 152 votes, then Portland with 120 votes and finally Scarborough with 76 votes.

Check out clear, concise, placements on college campuses signs consistent colors (White background and maroon and blue writing?). Directionally challenged need bright, clear, 'in your face and close to the road everywhere' signage.
- Maybe change our motto: listed as 'Windham Works for Maine'. Adding BRIDGTON's pun Maine=Main or Maine=ME (example: "The Touring Place for ME and You")
- This could incorporate part of community clean up (when rake leaves/ brush center open, etc.) to better each signage every year. Each section/crew adopts signage and neighboring areas who need help. Each section is responsible for sign in spring...::cough, cough:: community involvement a must. Feel proud every drive-by OR reminder shame to make it better. All who sponsor that sign gets name/phone number on back.
- When people think of Windham, I don't think nature is what comes to mind first. The town is known more for the downtown area. I think any imagery should represent that fact.
- Windham, North and South, like the sign for Bridgton says, is a Place for All seasons too. The sign is simple. I like that Scarborough has "club" signs at the bottom.
- High contrast between background and foreground colors is necessary for accessibility
- Glad to see you're moving ahead with this. Please contact me if you need more access to any

 designed, don't hesitate to reach out. (Greta)
- The Portland one is vibrant and easy to read. The Bridgton one is nice, but smaller fonts are confusing/hard to read, and not informative. Falmouth one is very legible too, but town name too

small and not as pretty as Portland. Scarborough is gawd awful. Yucky color, illegible; but the marsh grass concept is cool.

- Windham is a up and coming community with many outdoor activities, a wonderful vacation destination etc. The signage should reflect its vibrancy and look refreshing and inviting. Not sleepy and stuffy like Bridgton.
- Please make the signage for what Windham is, not an image you want to portray. Thank you for your work.
- I like both the Scarborough and Bridgton signs which include Welcome To. I like the simple graphics on Scarbrough.
- Consistent with area towns.
- Thank you for asking. Appreciate being able to provide some input!
- We certainly need signage to be practical and informative but try to incorporate some character into these signs. Sometimes we can get a little bland with public projects in the name of practicality and economy but maybe we could strive for a bit more. Could we involve some artistic people?
- Concise, simple and easy to read while driving is important.
- I love the blue color of Portland sign. We should promote nature~ fresh air, blue skies, lakes, streams, outdoor activities- all the natural resources Windham has to offer.
- Easy to read and provides consistent Windham presence but CLEAR definition of what info it
 intends to share, i.e. arrow to BEACHES, SHOPPING, RESTAURANTS, PARK and then a
 matching sign at the locations previously indicated.
- Is signage necessary? I feel it invites outsiders and allows them easier access around our town. Is this what we want? More traffic more business more infrastructure and higher taxes? I sure don't. I answered the questions honestly with a few jokes in there but at the end of the day I don't want growth. It'll ruin this town.

 Canton, Connecticut where smaller shops and big box stores are together but look appealing.

 between the text and the background, so that the signs are readable QUICKLY & EASILY...
 Including easily read text for drivers...NO TINY TEXT that you have to squint at to read, while
 you are driving.

- You have a difficult job. It is not easy to make choices for a whole community. Someone is

- Portland/Falmouth have signage that is easy to read and pleasing at a glance. The information is concise, and to the point.
- We have an active cannabis community in Windham as well.
- Also, I like the picture version of Portland, but I fear it will be too busy for Windham. My actual
 answer is the simple style like Falmouth (smaller signs) not the picture from Scarborough.
- I prefer the Scarborough sign because it has the civic groups in the town listed. Not that color combo though.
- I don't like Bridgton at all, it's outdated.
- The picture and wording for question 14 are mixed up on my mobile device for Falmouth and Scarborough. I actually like both it's hard to pick as one is a welcome sign and one is a directions sign.
- Keep it clean and classy
- Are your sign color choices appropriate for people who are color blind? Red, greens, and blues
 can blend together and may be difficult for certain individuals to see. I am not personally color
 blind, and it may be a non-issue. I would just consider getting input from a few individuals who
 are.
- Falmouth and Bridgton signage styles are most appropriate for Windham as well.

- Take down the "Home of the . . ." signs with all the sports champions. They look awful because there are too many add-ons. Make nice new simple "Welcome to Windham" signs and leave the other stuff off. You can make a one "champions" signs near the town hall or school campus.
- Make it clean, easy to ready and classic
- Try to keep it friendly and welcoming, not industrial, I know Windham is growing but it has always felt like a small and family-based community- and it started very rural with lots of farmland. It'd be great to keep that feeling around as we progress
- It looks like it's part of nature, but you can still see it. (Scarborough)
- I think the Falmouth ones are nice and easy to pick out without being trendy and running the risk of aging out.
- Windham has a covered bridge which is unique in the area. Could we use the limited palette
 but with slightly bolder/deeper colors? It's important the signage be clear and easy to read as
 well as memorable. Keeping the North and South Windham names are what the residents
 know, and they align to the historic sites in the area.
- I like the Bridgton sign because it is highlighting the town name and has a more old-fashioned Maine look.
- I like the Bridgton sign with the information listed under the picture on the Portland sign
- Wherever signage lands, I hope it is consistently updated throughout town. This is a great opportunity to promote brand and image for Windham. Thanks for offering the survey!
- I don't love the circular symbols at the bottom of the Falmouth sign but do love the overall symbolic it's and grace of it. and I like the Bridgton sign too.
- Scarborough really did a great job and they carry it over to their website.
- Most signs are going to be seen be people driving by in vehicles. There is no point in having
 printing on signs that is too small to read at speed. Please avoid fancy fonts that are not very
 easy to read. Don't put too much on a sign; better to have more signs that are easy to read.
- Make the sign welcoming people to WINDHAM without being too over cluttering so WINDHAM
 is the first that catches the eye of passing motorists
- Roads need to have both road names, often it is just the side street name. Tourists and nonlocals have no idea what the name of the road they are coming to from a side street. Please keep in mind color blindness as well.
- I find it easiest to read especially from a distance. (Bridgton)
