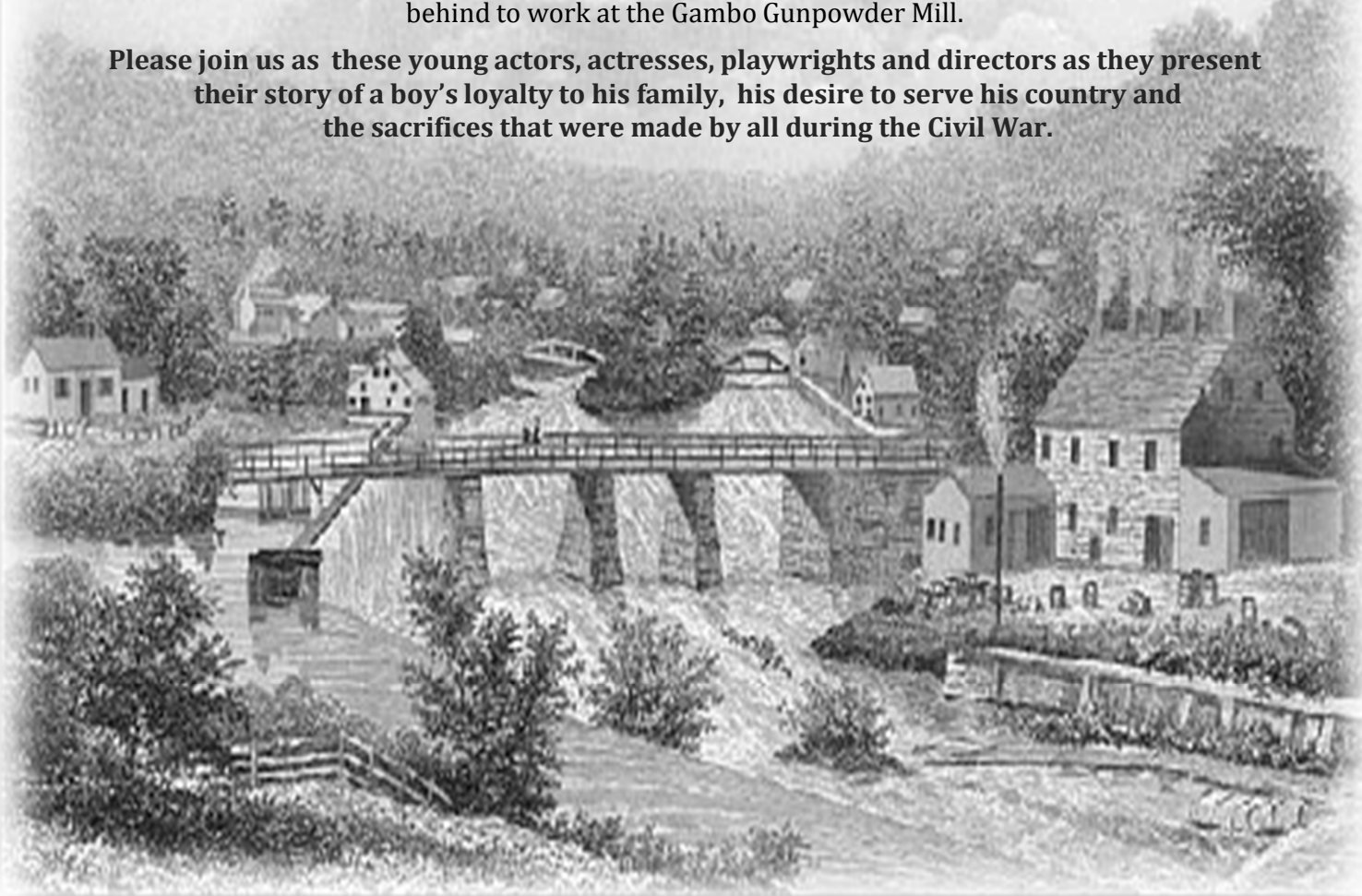
The struggle of a boy torn between his family and country
