Stephen Napolitano - He congratulated the Town of Windham coming out and voting in incredible numbers and also passing our Recall Ordinance. He said he thinks it is a great success in the making for our town to have something in place to restore integrity on how we do business; it is a bipartisan ordinance.

He said he knows that the Council is planning on looking at the language and matching it up with the Charter, and he appreciates all the effort going into that, but keep in mind that the people voted with the numbers in place and they have heard a lot of chatter in past meetings that will be attacked. He hopes they respect the election, just like they respect everybody that voted in Mark and Linda, and congratulations to them. They respect the fact that you are voted in and the same with the Recall. He hopes they just focus on the language verses protecting numbers that would benefit politicians.

Stephen said he knows tonight they will be appointing a Chair and Vice Chair, and talking about the Ethic's Committee. He wanted to share his concern about Councilor Maxfield ever being considered for either a Chair ever again or being on any part of the Ethic's Committee. He said this was a gentleman who followed him out of a School Board meeting, and inside he said despicable things to him, defamed him in public, and there are many witnesses and video on the outside when he was followed out, and anything that has to do with ethics, he should not even be in the conversation to make decisions for the town. He said you are not just a Councilor sitting behind a computer; Barry is our

I did not read in your Ethics Code that the title of Councilor must be used in correspondence to differentiate from acting as a private citizen. You are saying that as long as a councilor does not say he/she is a Councilor then any influencing, interfering or affecting an election is the action of a private citizen. Seems like a flaw in the ethical code; or at least it highlights that the ethical code does not adequately define the veiled distinction between private citizen and Councilor. Whenever a Councilor removes his badge he can do all the political bashing, trashing and name calling we have all witnessed recently. Thus Private Citizen Maxfield can influence, interfere or affect an election and then return to his Councilor chair to reap the benefits obtained from his incendiary, inflammatory, and very public muckraking. Certainly what this councilor does as a private citizen reflects poorly on your whole Council and our Town and on Maine whether he speaks as a private citizen or not.

If, as you say in your letter, the policy does not apply, then I submit that the policy does not address inappropriate private citizen behavior and your Council's ethical compass should be re-calibrated. Now I'm asking for an overhaul of your Council's Municipal Code of Ethics.

Acceptable conduct would allow endorsements of a candidate without the use of an official title. So then what is Unacceptable conduct? Maybe the Council is unaware of the use of Councilor David Nadeau's Municipal eMail to endorse and encourage the election of Marge Govoni to School Board. There has been no sanction for that; No accountability. It appears that the Council is conflated on the ethical difference between a Council of and a Private Citizen.

This Ethical Code is a counterfeit construct put in place to insulate the Councilors from the rules. Everyone knows that he is a Councilor. How can that be ignored, manipulated, and/or justified by a Code that is labeled ethical? In effect, the Council grants discretionary immunity to itself through a pretend ethical code. No ethical Ethical Code would protect such destructive defamation by shrouding Councilor Maxfield in the garb of a private citizen. Everyone knows that he is a Councilor.

The Town has been wounded by the political attacks and divisive public commentary of a Council member in his role as a private citizen. An apology would go a long way toward mending and healing in a gesture of leadership from a private citizen who was once elected to do good community work.

Ethically, there should be no difference between the conduct of private citizen and public councilor. And a public council not hide behind the freedoms of citizenry.

Town Manager, even when he is not in this building; what kind of look do you want for this town? It is a responsibility, and they appreciate the effort that all of them are taking, and they should be operating with integrity at all times, not just while in here. Ken Clark - He came to address some things he thought were unethical. There were emails that they found where Dave Nadeau was recommending Marge Govoni for School Board, and she got elected and he congratulated her on their efforts.

He showed some pictures that Marge supports, which he said was fine, everyone has different view points. He said these books are in the school and there a lot of parents against them. He finds it inappropriate for a Town Councilor to be using town emails to push to have someone elected to School Board who kind of supports this type of stuff. Mr. Clark said kids can get their hands on these books, and parents have no way of knowing. He said this is important stuff, and these are children doing pornography.

He wants to be on the Long Term Planning Committee, as he is a little concerned about taxes. He said we are doing a whole lot of spending, doing high density residential growing in the center of town, which will cause the property to go up and it will be harder for commercial people to make investments in the town. We know that residential has a high impact on our services, our schools and those are things that cause taxes to go up. Will we be doing something to address taxes going down and also the congestion?

Mark York - He said he doesn't want the Roman Catholic Church to build anything at the end of the road, as he has been living on Pettingill Pond his entire life. There are lots of different opinions, and the change and growth in this town has been good. Should we slow it down, it is up to all of us to decide, and he said he appreciates all of these people coming out to be here.

VI. Councilors' Comments.

Councilor Morrison - Thanked the people for their comments and feedback. He said they need to make sure when you talk about individuals and individual's behavior, it needs to be factual and provide evidence. He is not a social media guy and he has not been aware of some of the accusations made of Councilor Maxfield. He said "we as Councilors also are citizens, we also have our first amendment rights. There is a difference between being a Councilor and our duties; we need to act ethically, respectfully, converse with town's people with a civil level of decorum, have calmed discussions and speak to the facts and not make it personal."

With respect to Councilor Nadeau, it is in their documentation on tonight's agenda; there was a questioning of Councilor Nadeau and the use of his email. They had a review by an attorney who is not the Town's Attorney, to make sure they had full transparency and to have an unbiased opinion, and the Attorney did not find that it rose to a level of impropriety. It was asked that we take a look at it again by a fellow Councilor. It was

looked at again by another Attorney, and again, it was found that there was no merit in that accusation in regards to Mr. Nadeau, for the record.

Councilor Maxfield said as Councilors they actually have less rights then everybody else. specifically against defamation and liable. Folks can stand up at the microphone and say anything they want; like I chased them into a parking lot after a School Board meeting, and that has been asked and answered a hundred times, it did not happen. He said during the meeting when Mr. Napolitano came up to him with Mr. Clark next to him and asked to shake his hand, he refused to shake his hand, and he refused to shake his hand for things he has not said in public about him. He has done him the respect of not saying that in public. Councilor Maxfield said he stood after Mr. Napolitano said to him that he was shocked that an elected official would not shake his hand. He said he stood in that room for another two or three minutes with another resident speaking about the resident, when he walked out, a member of their group who likes to record things walked him out of the building talking about the appointment of Marge Govoni to the School Board and she was holding her phone the whole time and recording him. He said he walked to his car where the group was in the car next to him. Councilor Maxfield asked Mr. Napolitano if he would like to know why he wouldn't shake his hand, at which point he was screamed at by the two of them, surround by a group of eight people and a giant gentleman got in his face until the police had to come. Councilor Maxfield said "put the video out or stop talking about it."

He said, as a Councilor, he has much less rights against liable and defamation. You can lie about me, go on line and lie about him, and because he is an elected official dedicating his time to the town he has less rights. What less rights he does not have is for freedom of speech. He is fully allowed to be involved anyway he wants. He said most people in town do not know they are town councilors. He does not have a town councilor Facebook page, he does not post under town councilor, he does not mention being a town councilor. He is fully allowed in his rights, as an American. He said this has been a non-political Council for years, and what has happened in the last six months is politics and petty bitterness brought in here. He will not be resigning, he is going to continue to do his job for the Town of Windham, and keep responding to those people who keep asking him to stand up, and he will use his voice anytime he can do it. Someone also said that he said that somebody raped somebody; send that post to this Town Council, because he never said that. He hopes they can move past that and the Ethic's Committee can devise some rules and adjustments to the policy.

He finished with an email they received from Gary Plummer talking about the recall. Gary said he doesn't support recalls but he did support the People's Recall going forward on its own, without the Council putting it on something else for the folks to have two options. What he did say is "as individuals you can work to defeat their measure." It is not just this Council's Rules, it is the courts of the United States, the courts of Maine."

Councilor Reiner said he appreciated everyone showing up tonight for public comment as he enjoys what people have to say and it is good feedback for them. In regard to the ethic's complaint, he probably put our Chairman in a difficult position, as he has been persistent in getting an answer from the lawyers in getting an answer on use of Council's email or how wording in the emails are presented. He said they did get an answer back and he was not satisfied with it, so he challenged it again. So, there has been work in that area behind the scenes, it was not glossed over or dismissed, it was addressed and he has seen the answers from the attorneys, and as far as he is concerned, he is satisfied with the answers they have received.

He asked when the People's Recall Initiate might take effect? Manager Tibbetts said it

will become effective 10 days after the vote, which will be November 17, 2023. He knows the recommendation from one of the Councilors was to start a bipartisan, multi focal committee to look at the language and wording. He would like to get ahead of this before the next meeting, if they can take the ordinance, as written, present it to our legal Counsel and have them redline anything they feel in the language, which would be indefensible or does not fit within the guidance of our Charter at this time. He is only looking for language that would be inappropriate; he does not want to have any recommendations from our legal Counsel as far as numbers, percentages, or anything like that. Those things were voted on and appropriate and legal at the time when it was written.

Councilor Kalogerakis congratulated Mark and Linda on the election. He said to the three individuals, Steve, Kristen and Justin that spear headed the People's Ordinance, congratulations. He said he was very vocal that he did not like one of the numbers, which was no specific number on voter turnout. He does not like the situation we have now with certain groups and the Council sparing back and forth. His commitment this year is to quell that as much as he can by continuing to reach out, have conversations and find out how they can meet common ground and move forward. There is no winner in the way it is going now. His efforts will be to try and get them back together, they will not always get what they want, and when that happens they have to move forward and try to find other solutions. This election and what has been going on in social media, it is disgusting and it was disgusting on both sides, and he thinks they all need to look at that first. He hopes in the future people can stick to the issues, whether you like someone or not. Those are his hopes and prayers.

Councilor Maxfield said with regard to the Recall the only thing to do is strike the part that violates the Charter, everything should stand until they have a committee and have people work on it together. Everything else is really up for debate and just have the Charter issues that need to be fixed. He supports doing that at the next meeting so it is cleaner, then decide how to proceed forward with the rest of it.

Manager Tibbetts said he will have the attorney go through it and identify that issue, which is contrary to what the Charter says. They will red line it for the Council to consider and leave the rest as is. The numbers are a policy issue.

Planning Board Recommendation - #23-31 Amendment to Code of the Town of Windham Chapter 120 Land Use Ordinance, Article 4 Zoning Districts, related to two-family dwellings, and Article 5 Performance Standards, related to accessory apartments.

Overview

At the Planning Board meeting on October 23, 2023, a public hearing was held on the proposed amendments to the Land Use Ordinance Article 4 Zoning Districts, related to two-family dwellings, and Article 5 Performance Standards, related to accessory apartments, in order to comply with the state law LD 2003, An Act To Implement the Recommendations of the Commission To Increase Housing Opportunities in Maine by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions. To implement the law, the Town must make adjustments to existing land use regulations as it relates to requirements of allowing structures with up to 2 dwelling per lot and parking requirements for accessory dwelling units. Staff is also proposing some additional changes to the standards for Accessory Apartments to improve administration and remove some of the barriers to developing this housing type. The Town Council Ordinance Committee unanimously recommended the amendments.

Summary of Proposed Changes

- Article 4 Zoning Districts
 - o Dwelling, Two-Family are permitted uses without exception in the Farm (F), Farm-Residential (FR), Light-Densit Residential (RL) and Commercial III (C-3) Districts
- Article 5 Performance Standards, Section 120-501 Accessory apartments
 - o Increase the maximum size from 600 square feet to 800 square feet
 - o Limit the number of bedrooms to 2
 - o Allow permits to run with the property instead of the owner
 - o Remove requirements for recording permits in the Registry of Deeds

Planning Board Review and Recommendation

One member of the public provided comment at the Planning Board's public hearing held on October 23, 2023, asking if four-unit buildings would be allowed where single family homes are allowed.

The Board discussed how the Town was already in compliance with allowing four-unit buildings required by LD 2003 in growth areas, the reasons for increasing the minimum size for accessory apartments, that even though duplexes would be allowed everywhere accessory apartments were still necessary for lots that didn't have the net density to have another dwelling but required it to be owner-occupied. Following discussion of the proposed changes, the Board made the following motion:

To recommend approval of the proposed amendments to Chapter 120 Land Use Ordinance Article 4 Zoning Districts, related to two-family dwellings, and Article 5 Performance Standards, related to accessory apartments.

systems. We are more restrictive with the sizing for these accessory apartments in our Ordinance today, and where they are proposing to add duplex units to these same districts, it does not seem appropriate to have a septic system requirement that is greater for an apartment than they would for a duplex. They are proposing an additional change for the Council to consider as an amendment.

Amendment: Section 120-501(I) strike the end of the first sentence with the words "to accommodate the wastewater volume from two dwelling units" and instead replace that with: "A property on which an accessory apartment is located shall require the installation and the use of a septic system that is in accordance with the State of Maine Subsurface Wastewater Disposal rules."

The Planning Board had a general discussion and unanimously made a vote to recommend the changes to the Council.

Public Comment:

Mark York He said it was interesting that this is coming up when the church cancelled this meeting. Are we looking to change farm land usage? Amanda said the answer is no.

Amanda said LD 2003 is a State law enacted a two years ago that requires municipalities to make these changes to Land Use Ordinances to increase the availability of housing, so there is several components related to providing density bonuses for affordable housing developments in growth areas to allowing up to four units to be built on properties in growth areas. The two they are addressing tonight are the elements related to municipalities have to allow for accessory dwelling units, they can't require more parking for them, and we have to allow for duplexes, essentially, every where else in town that is not a growth area.

Mark York said he went to a meeting a month ago and he wanted to remind everyone that the church is within that growth area that the town wants to grow.

Planning Board Recommendation - #23-32 Amendment to Code of the Town of Windham Chapter

120 Land Use Ordinance, Article 4 Zoning Districts, Section 120-413 Industrial District (I).

Overview

At the Planning Board meeting on October 23, 2023, a public hearing was held on the proposed Land Use to the Land Use Ordinance Article 4 Zoning Districts, § 120-413 Industrial District (I). The amendments were drafted by staff following discussion with development opportunities in the I District with Windham Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) and I property owners. The changes would allow for development in the I District to be more similar in uses and dimensional and performance standards as those found in the § 120-414 Enterprise Development District (ED). The Town Council Ordinance Committee unanimously recommended the amendments.

The I District is shown on the Town of Windham Land Use Map in South Windham between River Road and the Presumpscot River around Gambo Road, and at Mallison Falls Road. The ED District is in North Windham off Enterprise Drive. The I District boundaries and standards today are substantively the same as when Windham's first Land Use Ordinance and Zoning Map were adopted in 1976, although seven residential properties along River Road were removed from the I District in January 2023. The ED District was established in 1999.

Summary of Proposed Changes

- Additional Permitted Uses
 - Business and professional office; Contractor services; Contractor services, landscaping; Contractor storage yard; Construction services, heavy, major; and Construction services, heavy, minor.
- Front Setback reduced from 100 feet to 40 feet
- Addition of required buffer yard along street (Buffer Yard A, 30 feet)
- Removal of open space requirement and replacement with new maximum building coverage and maximum impervious area standard
- Required screening of outdoor storage from view of public ways

Planning Board Review and Recommendation

No members of the public spoke for or against the proposed amendment during the Planning Board's public hearing held on October 23, 2023.

The Board discussed how the 30 foot buffer along the street sounded prohibitive and should not be the same for office uses compared to other commercial uses, but that the buffer was more important when abutting an existing residential property, the reduced setback did not protect the residential homes, that storage should
