

Message to the Community

This past year we celebrated our one year anniversary as MaineHealth Care at Home which prompted us to reflect on our successes and opportunities. By joining together the former HomeHealth Visiting Nurses, Kno-Wal-Lin and Waldo County Home Health and Hospice organizations, we established a stronger foundation to deliver care for patients, of all ages, throughout a vast and predominantly rural service area. We also secured expert clinical resources that advanced the following initiatives:

- 1) Completed a successful and full integration of EPIC in our Coastal Division.
- Executed a new contract with the Department of Human Services restoring important provisions to provide home nursing care, at no charge, to newborn infants and mothers.
- 3) Launched Phase I staff training on core elements of dementia and behavioral health.
- 4) Expanded the depth and scope of Telehealth care to serve a broader patient population with serious and sometimes life-limiting illnesses.
- 5) Maintained commitment to our not-for-profit mission by offering more than 1 million dollars in charity and uncompensated care.

In striving for organizational excellence, we faced several financial challenges related to the associated costs of growth and integration. With a firm foundation now in place, we are confident in our ability to secure a more solid financial position in 2018. We also are confident that our partnerships within the MaineHealth system will help support and expand services to those in need of home health and hospice care.

In closing, we thank our strong team of employees, dedicated Board of Directors, committed volunteers, and generous donors for their contributions to MaineHealth Care at Home. It is a privilege to work together to make our communities the healthiest in America.


Building a Healthier Community


This past year, MaineHealth Care at Home (MHCAH) brought care, healing, and comfort to more than 26,000* children, adults and elders:

- 16,000 patients maintained independence and health with 150,000 home visits from registered nurses, rehabilitative therapists, social workers, home health aides, and nutritionists.
- 1,800 newborns and mothers got a healthy start with home nursing visits offered, at no charge, through a state-funded Maternal and Children's Health Grant.
- 500 patients received end-of-life care and comfort with hospice services.
- 200 patients received hospice services in the supportive environment of the Sussman House.
- 3,200 people improved their health with foot care, screenings, and tests at community clinics.
- 3,500 people were vaccinated as a step toward flu prevention.
- 100 people received supportive home care and companion services through Help-At-Home.
- 1,000 people lived more safely with Lifeline Emergency Response Services.

COMPASSIONATE CARE

As part of our mission to care for those in greatest need, MHCAH provided \$230,864 in charity care services and \$800,000 in care not reimbursed by government programs.

Volunteer Contributions

The Coastal Division Volunteers—members include local Auxiliaries, Sussman House Support Volunteers, and Home Care Volunteers—contributed nearly 4,000 hours to support our patients and staff. At the Sussman House, volunteers routinely provided 12 hours a day of front desk coverage, baked and cooked for families and visitors, and maintained our gardens and indoor plants. Volunteer fundraising efforts supported Baby O Baby, a pediatric assistance program, Memory Bear and Memory Pillow programs for those who have lost a loved one, and holiday gifts for patients in Lincoln County.

A holiday "Tree for Warmth" program distributed donated scarves, mittens, gloves, socks, and hats to nearly 200 deserving clients and neighboring school children in Knox County. Talented craftspeople made patient comfort items to include neck pillows, rice packs, and chair platforms. One volunteer carpenter produced over 30 chair platforms for our physical therapy department.


The Lincolnville Women's Club provided rice packs and monthly gift cards to support the Sussman House. The women's sewing group of the Federated Church of Thomaston made neck pillows for patients in the MidCoast region. Volunteers raised scholarship funds for clinical workshops and continuing education.

A dedicated volunteer group assisted with staffing community clinics, essential administrative functions, and special projects. The hard-working crew of the United Way Day of Caring in York County transformed our gardens at our Saco headquarters. We thank these volunteers for their tremendous support and dedication.

The Power of Volunteerism

In our quest to learn more about what compels volunteers to give so generously of their time, we started our interviews with Roger Wickenden, a volunteer at the Sussman House.

In meeting Roger for the first time, we are warmly greeted with a wide smile and sparkling eyes. His passion and commitment are soon evident as he takes charge in the kitchen preparing today's batch of chocolate chip cookies. Within minutes, the warm, sweet aroma permeates the house putting all of us at ease and ready for our interview.

Roger first learned of the Sussman House in November 2015. His beloved mother, 99 years of age, fractured her pelvis and decided to forego surgery and treatments.

Roger shares, "Despite being terrified of death, she made it very clear that she was ready to die."

As an orthopedic surgeon who dedicated his life to "fixing" patients, Roger had reservations about his Mom's decision. After years of helping so many patients gain independence through new knees and hips, it was difficult for Roger to accept the hospice philosophy of care. A turning point occurred when Sarah Dwelley, a hospice nurse gently stated, "I promise if you go to the Sussman House, you will be happy you came here."

With faith in her promise, Roger visited the hospice house and was transformed by the experience, "It was amazing, so tranquil...and I knew the second we walked in; we made the right decision."

Roger's mother lived eight days at the Sussman House, surrounded by a compassionate and caring team that brought her the gifts of comfort and dignity. Four generations of her family surrounded her with love. Roger laughs when he shares, "many of the times, we had fifteen people in her room, laughing, sharing stories, and crying." One of Roger's most memorable moments occurred when a harpist—his mother's favorite instrument—came to play and she squeezed his hand at the first sounds of the harp.

We are closing our interview when Roger becomes visibly emotional and shares, "I was there with her for the entire eight days, and I decided right there and then that I would be a part of this facility until I died."

Roger is keeping his promise! He continues to volunteer each day making cookies, answering phones, gardening, cooking meals, and most importantly helping families and visitors feel like they are home!



Nancy & Jason: A Partnership in Rehabilitation

We first meet Nancy walking in front of her home with Jason supporting her left arm. They are both laughing and clearly engaged in a lively conversation. We simply can't believe that this patient had hip surgery last week. They wave to us, invite us into the home, and begin to share the development of this special patient and therapist partnership.

For the past five years Nancy's active life, as an artist and athlete, was compromised by severe hip pain mitigated by pain medications and cortisone shots. Determined to complete her 500-mile hike through Portugal, she had her sixth shot and set off for her journey.

Nancy shares, "Yeah, I did the trip, and then I got back and had an x-ray and it wasn't pretty. It was over." I definitely want wheels on the chariot, and I was losing a wheel. It just didn't look good. I could see it in an x-ray, and there was no ball and socket anymore."

Not wanting to be compromised in what she could or could not do, Nancy researched several surgeons and learned all she could about hip replacement surgery. She wanted the find the surgeon that would give her the confidence and the best chance for living her life as fully as possible. Nancy committed to surgery and shares its success, "I will never forget, it was maybe three hours after the surgery, the doctor came in and said it was perfect. Then I remember standing up, thinking this is unbelievable, this is amazing. I am walking!"

From surgery to discharge home, Nancy is excited about the opportunity to regain her life without pain or compromise. Jason, her physical therapist, is equally excited to partner with Nancy. "She's the ideal patient as far as I'm concerned because she was extremely educated going into surgery, knew what to expect, and went into the surgery strong." Jason's role is to help her build endurance, strength, and balance within safe parameters. Jason adds, "She's the perfect teammate through all this, she's doing all the hard work, and I'm pointing her in the right direction."

Jason is enjoying his role in home health care adding, "Home health is unique, as the patient's primary goals are to regain function and the ability to be home. My goal is to get Nancy back to traveling the world so it will inspire new paintings."

"I never pondered having home health care or having a need for it until this surgery occurred...I want the



physical therapist to be there to tell me what I can or can't do and to understand why." We ask Nancy if she has another hiking trip in the back of her mind, "Yes, I have a few: England, Ireland, and Patagonia have amazing trails, so we'll see." I trust we will.
