Monthly Report January 2017

Projects:

The month of January allowed us to start and get caught up on various projects that are new or on going.

Homeland Security Grant: Last summer Chief Libby and I wrote a grant through the Department of Homeland Security to upgrade security and access to the Public Safety Building. The grant was to install the necessary software and hardware for proximity key card / FOB readers. The grant is for \$24,000 the final report submitted to the Federal Dept. of Homeland Security has been approved. Our goal is to have the project complete prior to summer time. This project will allow future expansion to our fire substations as future budgets / grants may allow.

Maine Bureau of Highway Safety: Sgt. Fulton has applied for and received a grant to allow us to pay overtime costs associated with providing extra patrols dedicated to speed enforcement. Consistent feedback from the public has been traffics / speed is a significant concern to the quality of life in Windham. We are hopeful that these efforts will have an effect to decrease the volume of crashes we investigate and manage as a department. Another component of the grant is the procurement of a new radar unit for the department. The enforcement component of the grant is \$5600 the radar unit is \$2,000 for cumulative total of \$7600.

LESO: Sgt. Ray Williams and CSO Matt Cyr have reestablished our department's utilization of the LESO military surplus program. This program provides department equipment free of charge; we are responsible for shipping costs. Some items received to date, are automated electronic defibrillators, safety glasses for firearms training, first aid kits pelican battery chargers to names

Body Worn Camera Grant: The Bureau of Justice Assistance this year is providing grant for body worn cameras. Sgt. Fulton and I had explored applying for the grant. Preliminary work was done on the grant; however the logistics of providing various levels of data and hold stakeholders meeting as required by the grant did not allow enough time to meet the deadline. We will revisit this idea in the future either via grant opportunities or capital project funding.

Staffing: Currently we still have one vacant position based on our budgetary allotment of 27 sworn officers and three non-sworn positions.

Officers Devyn Rogers and Jeff Ruth are still in their respective field training programs. All reports are indicating they are performing extremely well and we are very happy that they are members of our department. We are excited about what each officer will offer to our department and the community.

We are currently performing a background investigation on an out of state certified officer. After a preliminary review of the officers' training records and discussion with the administration of the Maine Criminal Justice Academy, there most likely would be a waiver of the full 18 week training academy once certain classes and waiver tests are completed.
