#### Dear Parents/Guardians and Community Members,

Spring has sprung and it is a wonderful time of year as we celebrate the ending of another fine school year. As a school community, we can be incredibly proud given the talents of our students and how we always stay true to our mission, "Success for All."

Indeed, it has been an ambitious year implementing our newly adopted Strategic Plan. We know all the thoughtful planning is important and with the stellar efforts of our employees, the work moves forward and never has time to sit on a shelf.

As we think about our 3 long-term goals: 1) Design for Learning; 2) Environment for Learning; and 3) Technology for Learning; we are excited to embark on seeking adoption of our proposed FY 18 Budget knowing our journey will ensure that our students achieve at a high level.

Americans once again name the lack of financial support as the biggest problem facing our schools and their communities with regards to public school funding. This has been a consistent message from the public for the past ten years. (PPK Gallup Poll, Sept., 2015) We continue to have budget challenges at the forefront. RSU 14 will receive \$816,428 less state aid funding in the coming year. As a reminder to you, the State's inability to live up to its obligation to pay 55% of the cost of education is effecting budgets across the state. Maine is currently funding 46% of the 55% target funding that was placed in to law in 2009.

RSU 14 has seen slow student enrollment growth and we have held fairly steady at just over 3000 students for the past several years. Even with this growth, we have not seen complimentary increases in state allocations. In fact, when the Windham and Raymond School Departments regionalized eight years ago, the district received \$14.5 million. It is proposed that the district receive a similar state allocation of \$14.5 million nine years later.

In Cumberland County alone, 11 of 14 school systems are seeing significant decreases in the subsidy for FY18. Please understand that more than half the districts in the state are losing money under the proposed budget. Less state aid funding can shift costs to local communities and requires higher property taxes.

Between 2004-05 and 2014-15 school years, total state spending on "system administration" actually declined from \$69.5 million to \$66.7 million. The state average system administration expenditures for 2015-2016 were at 3.11% - RSU 14 was at 2.72%.

We continue to take our fiscal oversight very seriously. The state average per pupil cost is \$12,940 – RSU14 is spending \$366.00 less per pupil based on the recent data from the Department of Education for the 2015-2016 school year.

Another challenge for RSU 14 has been the shift of Maine Public Employees Retirement (MePERS) expenses to local taxpayers. The MePERS "normal" costs have had a detrimental effect on local taxes – an increase to our FY18 operating budget alone of \$839,000.

The \$44,799,277 FY18 budget reflects a 3.98% increase over last year. To give you a nine-year perspective, the budget has only increased at an average rate of 1.62% between 2009 and 2018. It is clear that we provide a high quality educational experience for our students at a great value.

All these factors contribute to why the proposed budget has an increase of 3.98%. It has been our practice to provide the public with information that will allow for informed decision making. As always, we appreciate the support of our Windham and Raymond communities as we move through the budget process. We believe we have built a responsible and prudent school budget that provides the most value to our greatest assets, our children.

The budget validation referendum will be held on June 13, 2017. Polls open at Windham High School and Jordan Small Middle School: 7:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m.

I truly hope you can get out to vote - your continued support is valued and most appreciated.






