# July 2018

#### **Summary**

It is the mission of Social Services to improve the quality of life for people in need<sup>1</sup> who reside in the Town of Windham, by:

- Promoting economic self-sufficiency; and
- Connecting people with those resources made available by the Town, the state and the federal government, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

Each month the current status of the program will be assessed using the following measures identified in the budget narrative.

- **1.** People in need are counseled and provided information and referrals regarding local, regional, state and federal social service programs.
  - a. In July, as in previous months, we coordinated with government and community based agencies that offer resources to strengthen individuals and families and promote economic self-sufficiency, such as Project Feed, USDA, DHHS Emergency Funds, and the Aspire Program. We also coordinated with other providers of social services, such as the Good Shepherd Mobile pantry, Opportunity Alliance which administers LIHEAP; RTP Bus Service, Salvation Army and Neighbors Helping Neighbors.
  - b. Social Services made/received six hundred and forty-six (646) phone calls<sup>2</sup>; interviewed forty-five (45) individuals for direct general assistance<sup>3</sup>, and provided food/non-food assistance to four hundred and seventy-four (474) households. Each individual was provided education and information regarding additional resources available to them and encouraged to investigate these programs, and in many cases received assistance from staff (phone calls, emails, etc.) to connect with these services.
- 2. People in need that qualify for General Assistance under the Ordinance receive temporary assistance for basic needs.

- a. In July, four hundred and seventy-four (474) households in need were assisted by the Food Pantry and/or the Clothes Closet.
- b. Vouchers are provided for housing, winter emergency fuel, or electrical assistance to those who qualify for it, under applicable law<sup>4</sup>. All decisions are rendered within twenty-four (24) hours as required by the state. In July two (2) residents qualified for direct general assistance.
- c. Staff continued to reach out to members of the community, local businesses and NGO's that support with their time and their donations. In July, the Food Pantry received \$1,025.00 in donations and fifty-six (56) community members volunteered one hundred and twenty-eight (128) hours of their time.

## 3. The annual audit demonstrates compliance with state regulations.

**a.** An annual audit was conducted in February of 2018 by the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Field Examiner, Gerry Biron, and he noted 100% compliance in all areas.

All of the programs located at the Family Resource Center, support the mission of Social Services and <u>all</u> of those that sought assistance in July received <u>some type</u> of assistance – food/non-food, educational/informational, or financial<sup>5</sup>.

As a result of these efforts, and the generosity of so many groups and individuals, assistance was provided to over five hundred (500) eligible individuals and their families while working to help them to achieve improved self-sufficiency.

## Highlights

- Idexx has started Monday deliveries of fresh vegetables.
- The Windham Correctional Center delivered over two hundred and fifty (250) pounds of lettuce and beet greens. What a treat for Food Pantry clients!
- Brenda Mattson brought in an assortment of fresh vegetables from her garden. Thanks, Brenda!
- Marge Govoni brought 4 large totes filled with bags of food from the school year back pack program to help provide families with children healthy food. Thank you, Marge!
- Manchester School brought in zucchini, cucumbers and peppers from their garden. What a nice surprise!
- The Pinea Rebekah Lodge brought in sixteen (16) "Project Night Night" bags containing a stuffed animal, book and blanket for comfort and security to children staying in Windham shelters.
- The Food Pantry helped to supply snacks and lunch items for children who are came to the summer camp program without any food.
- All clients were encouraged and reminded to come to the Food Pantry each week, in addition to their monthly visits for fresh fruit, vegetables, bread and pastries.

#### Statistics

- Three hundred and seventy-one (371) households were served through the Food Pantry; four (4) were new clients.
- Fifty-six (56) volunteers worked a total of one hundred and twenty-eight (128) hours in the Food Pantry and Clothes Closet.
- The Food Pantry received/made three hundred and ninety-five (395) phone calls.
- The Clothes Closet received eighteen (18) donations (multiple boxes/bags) of clothing and linens and served one hundred and three (103) households.
- The Food Pantry received fifty-five (55) donations from residents and fresh fruit, vegetables, baked goods, meat, and bread bi-weekly from Hannaford in Windham.
- Ten (10) thank you notes and/or receipts were sent to residents for their donations.
- General Assistance received/made two hundred and fifty-one (251) phone calls<sup>6</sup>.
- Forty-five (45) individuals were interviewed for direct general assistance: Thirty-seven (37) Windham; eight (8) Gorham.
- In July, two (2) Windham residents qualified for direct general assistance; no Gorham residents qualified for direct general assistance.
