Program Updates

Senior Trips/ Programs:

Fryeburg Fair – Although we had our usual group of fair-going seniors anxious to take part in Senior Day, Mother Nature did not allow for it, as it was canceled due to extreme rain conditions.

Rangeley Lake Region and Lunch at the Gingerbread House – Five of our local seniors joined in with our neighboring communities on a motorcoach to Height of the Land, and lunch in Oquossoc.

Ricker Hill Orchards – We traveled to Ricker Hill Orchards in Turner and enjoyed a guided tour of the packing facilities, the cider press, the cranberry bogs and the maple syrup boiler! Lunch stop at Terry and Maxine's following the tour.

Youth Programs:

<u>Arts in the Park:</u> The 2nd Annual Arts in the Park Event took place on Saturday, October 13th at the Town Hall Park from 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. There were 10 local artists and craftsmen that displayed or sold their work, and there were 4 group performances. The Community

Collaborative Art project was a large banner sponsored by Be the Influence in support of the upcoming skatepark project, and it was great to see artists of all ages added color to the banner.

Halloween Adventure: This annual event has grown immensely in the past couple of years, and We had 19 trunks in the "Trunk or Treat" event that needed to move indoors due to the weather, which included families, community organizations and businesses. We had volunteer support from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee, the Windham Library, the Lions Club, Windham High School and St. Joseph's College, along with some Windham parents who stepped up to help. We had a haunted house, games, crafts, refreshments and the everpopular Costume Contest, and estimated attendance at 800 people, including children and their parents.
