

Quarterly Report – July – September, 2021

Youth & Family Programs

- Summer Track
 - o 99 participants ages 5-14; Windham residents only due to staffing shortage
 - Hosted one meet with Gorham participating
- Summer Photo Contest
 - o 10 individuals entered 17 photos
- eSports Leagues
 - o 3 summer participants; we anticipate participation will increase again in winter
- Mad Science Day Camp

Adult and Senior Programs

For our Senior Programs, we are seeing a close to normal return to our program numbers. A variety of trips are offered for the Fall and early Winter. We have been able to increase the seating capacity on our vehicles while keeping CDC compliant (masks are required). Also, having the ability to offer free or reduced program costs through the Senior Scholarship fund, gives Seniors who live on a fixed income the chance to participate in some of the higher-priced trips. The scholarship program is utilized for nearly every trip and activity. 2 of the 4 upcoming Senior trips have moved to waitlist status, as these trips have filled.

Season Park passes were sold as single car households or double car households. Windham residents could receive the second pass for the double car household for free and non-residents for ½ price. 400 season passes were purchased and the total income was \$16,368. There were 70 public group (i.e. recreation departments or community organizations) reservations and 31 private group (families) reservations with a total income of \$5,593 (\$3 per person when making a reservation). There were 423 boat rentals with a total income of \$2,115 and concessions total is \$1,176.

Capital Improvements/ Facility Updates

- Windham Community Park –Phase II work completed at end of July; Basketball and Volleyball courts officially opened on July 26th; Response by the community has been extremely positive; "Come out and Play at the Park" is scheduled for Saturday, October 2nd, 9:00 a.m. 1:00 p.m.
- Lowell Preserve Parking lot expansion project underway; Management plan with Presumpscot Regional Land Trust and new trail map finalized in September; Conservation Easement signed and recorded
- Lippman Park Storage shed roofing project completed by Kevin Bailey (Park Maintenance Foreman) with support provided by Buildings and Grounds; Dustin Roma provided proposal to town for design and engineering services of parking lot expansion; Equipment failure on swingset caused us to remove swings Playground vendor is replacing the swingset, and has indicated they have received shipment and will be coming to install sometime in October
